What is DE?

This is a quick rundown of DofE and why you should do it with Tsunami Explorer Scout Unit.

The Duke of Edinburgh Scheme, DofE for short, is an amazing opportunity and national recognised award to broaden any young person's ambitions in life and give them a sense of responsibility, achievement and self-fulfilment which is sometime lacking in modern day young culture.

The Scheme is broken down into three levels, Bronze, Silver and Gold. You can jump straight in at any level depending on your age. You can start Bronze and Silver in the academic year that you turn 14 and 15 respectively, but for Gold you must be 16 before you can start. You have up till your 25th Birthday to complete your award but if you hold your ground and get on with it you can finish all three levels by your 18th Birthday like some other past Tsunami alumni.

Each DofE participant has a personal journey and as such each person's DofE programme will look different with varying goals. One thing they all have in common is that your Volunteering, Physical and Skills section has to be at least an hour a week. Below is a breakdown of the timeframes for all three awards.

Okay so you have a rough idea of the basics of the DofE programme. On top of the different sections, they will also need to complete the necessary training for the expedition section. This will consist of a couple of competition hikes to build teamwork and reinforce the need for navigational skills, First Aid (covered by a single day course) and several days out hiking in the South Downs with Nathan, the DofE Supervisor. Nathan has completed his Bronze, Silver and Gold DofE and completed his DofE Supervisor Training so he knows his stuff

At Tsunami we take the stance of train hard, complete easy. This refers to the fact that we will do a lot of training for Bronze but that's because if you make the foundation strong, you can build upon them easily to step up to Silver and then onto Gold.

We know that there are several options when completing the Duke of Edinburgh Award as many schools run their own scheme. However many explorers have regretted starting the scheme with their school.
